



MEESAGE FROM THE GENERAL SECRETARY





Mission

BVD works towards empowerment of the marginalized communities with special focus on women and children by creating awareness on the causes leading to denial of rights and asserting those rights as collective group with a commitment to build a responsible civil society just governance impact.

About Bal Vikas Dhara

Bal Vikas Dhara envisions a prosperous society founded on principles of social justice and equal rights for all, where every individual has the opportunity to thrive and fulfil their potential. Our mission is to empower marginalized communities, with a special emphasis on women and children. We strive to raise awareness about the root causes of rights denial and empower communities to assert their rights collectively. Through our efforts, we aim to foster a responsible civil society and advocate for just governance that prioritizes the needs of the marginalized.

Our Key Areas of Focus

- 1. **Child Rights:** We advocate for and protect children's rights, addressing issues such as child protection, child trafficking, child labour, child marriage, rehabilitation, and child abuse.
- 2. **Women Empowerment:** We promote women's empowerment through programs and initiatives aimed at enhancing their socio-economic status and fostering gender equality.
- 3. **Skill Development:** Our initiatives for skill development empower youth and women with the necessary skills for employment and self-reliance.
- 4. **Community Education Centres:** Operating 10 centres, we provide free non-formal and remedial education to 500 children from waste picker families, focusing on those not attending school.
- 5. **Waste Management:** We implement effective waste management strategies, contributing to environmental sustainability, livelihoods, and community health among waste pickers.
- 6. **Community Health & Hygiene:** Emphasizing community health, we provide free doctor consultations and offer medicines and pathology tests at reduced costs.
- 7. **Advocacy and Awareness Campaigns:** Our advocacy efforts aim to raise awareness about pressing social issues, mobilize support for policy change, and amplify the voices of marginalized populations.

Our Impact and Collaborations

BVD collaborates with national and international organizations to effectively implement our programs, leveraging resources and expertise to maximize impact. Our work primarily focuses on child development, women's empowerment, and youth employability and empowerment activities, especially engaging with waste pickers, daily wage labourers, women, youth, and children from marginalized communities. Through our holistic approach, we have positively impacted countless lives, contributing to sustainable community development.

BVD's consistent focus on community development and rights/welfare-based interventions has had a significant impact on marginalized communities, particularly in areas of health, education, and livelihood for informal laborers. Through its work, the organization continues to create pathways out of poverty for informal Workers and ensures their inclusion in the formal economy while striving for social justice and sustainable development.





PROJECT OVERVIEW (ACCESS TO JUSTICE)

The Access to Justice project undertaken by Bal Vikas Dhara in Delhi NCR has been instrumental in rescuing 576 children, including 44 girls and 532 boys, engaged in child labour and restoring their rights to safety, education, and dignity. Through this initiative, BVD has recovered back wages amounting to INR 14,534,580.5. This initiative focuses on identifying vulnerable children trapped in exploitative conditions, conducting rescue operations in collaboration with local authorities, and ensuring their rehabilitation through legal and educational support. Postrescue, the children are enrolled in educational programs and provided psychosocial care to help them reintegrate into society. The project also actively advocates for stronger implementation of child protection laws and sensitizes employers, families, and communities about the legal and moral consequences of child labour.

By addressing the root causes of child labour, such as poverty, illiteracy, and social marginalization, the initiative empowers families by linking them to social welfare schemes to prevent re-engagement in exploitative work. Beyond Delhi NCR, BVD extends its rehabilitation and follow-up efforts to Bihar, where 931 children and their families have been enrolled in social protection schemes, and 510 children and their families have been rehabilitated. Additionally, INR 928,682 in back wages has been recovered for these families.

Furthermore, BVD works closely with the judiciary, law enforcement, and community stakeholders to strengthen child protection mechanisms and create a sustainable ecosystem where children can thrive. Through this comprehensive approach, the project has rescued children from hazardous environments, provided them with tools for a brighter future, and reaffirmed the organization's unwavering commitment to justice, equality, and holistic development for marginalized communities.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

(Holistic Education, Health & Livelihoods)

Bal Vikas Dhara has implemented a holistic program integrating education, health, and livelihood support, fostering sustainable development within marginalized communities. The project runs six education centres providing Non-Formal Education (NFE) and remedial classes to children from the waste worker community, enabling 300 children to enhance their learning, of which 138 were successfully enrolled in formal schools this year. Additionally, a cutting and tailoring centre empowers 30 women annually with market-relevant skills, promoting economic independence. To further enhance livelihood opportunities, bailing machines have been distributed, helping community members improve waste management efficiency and augment their income. The project has also achieved an environmental milestone by recycling 152.603 tonne of used beverage cartons, contributing to sustainability and responsible waste management.

In the health vertical, a dedicated OPD centre has catered to 2,101 patients, and multiple health camps have benefitted 835 individuals this year. These camps not only offer consultations but also distribute medicines free of cost, while the OPD centre provides medicines at a 50% discount for beneficiaries, ensuring accessibility to essential healthcare services. This multifaceted initiative underscores Bal Vikas Dhara's commitment to addressing the educational, health, and economic needs of marginalized communities comprehensively, while also making strides in environmental conservation and sustainable practices.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

(Holistic Education, Health & Nutrition)

Our project embodies a holistic approach to improving the lives of waste worker families by addressing education, health, and nutrition. Through two dedicated education centres, we provide Non-Formal Education (NFE) and remedial classes tailored to the unique challenges faced by children from this marginalized community. These centres currently support 100 children, offering them a pathway to bridge educational gaps and prepare for formal schooling. As a result, 50 children have successfully transitioned to formal schools, marking a significant step toward breaking the cycle of poverty and providing these young learners with better opportunities for the future. Beyond academics, these centres foster a nurturing environment that promotes self-confidence, curiosity, and lifelong learning.

In addition to education, our health and nutrition initiatives aim to enhance the overall well-being of the community. Through a dedicated OPD centre, we have provided essential medical care to 2,264 patients in the year, ensuring accessible and affordable healthcare services for families who often lack such resources. Recognizing the importance of nutrition, we have also distributed Dabur nutritional products to 23,099 families, addressing critical dietary needs and boosting community health. These combined efforts not only improve immediate living conditions but also contribute to long-term resilience, empowering families to lead healthier and more productive lives.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

(ADVOCACY FOR WASTE WORKERS)

Bal Vikas Dhara's advocacy initiatives for sanitation workers have significantly strengthened their rights, well-being, and socio-economic inclusion. Over the past year, the project has witnessed remarkable growth in the network's membership, reach, and influence within the waste worker community. By fostering solidarity and amplifying collective voices, the network has become a powerful platform for sanitation workers to share their experiences and advocate for systemic change.

Key achievements include enhanced visibility thorough documentation of community initiatives and public meetings, showcasing the challenges and contributions of waste workers while bringing their issues to the forefront of policy dialogues.

Participation in impactful workshops such as "We Speak Too – By Sanitation Workers," IHD workshops, and AIW workshops has further empowered workers to articulate their rights and demand recognition for their invaluable contributions to society.

Through strategic partnerships with other networks like the DRT-AIW network and IAWP, the advocacy project has expanded its reach and influence, creating stronger alliances that bolster the collective cause. These collaborative efforts, combined with a commitment to documenting and amplifying the voices of waste workers, reflect Bal Vikas Dhara's dedication to building a sustainable, equitable future for this vital yet marginalized community.

PROJECT OVERVIEW (NADW)

The NADW project, implemented by Bal Vikas Dhara, has made significant strides in advocating for the well-being of domestic workers across India. Over the reporting period, the project successfully expanded its reach, increasing membership to 42,841 workers and establishing its presence in new areas, such as Alwar and Ajmer in Rajasthan, Bismillah Nagar, Guruppanapalya and Doddakamannahalli in Bangalore, and Khanpur and Inder camp in Delhi. The NADW have facilitated access to vital government benefits, including issuing 1,614 health cards, linking 1,760 Aadhaar cards with mobile numbers, and updating 2820 e-Shram cards. These efforts have enabled domestic workers to access old-age pensions, widow pensions, labor cards, and scholarships for their children, creating a strong foundation for social and economic security.

The project has also made significant contributions to awareness and capacity building. It organized impactful campaigns, such as the "Bonus Campaign," which reached over 5269 workers, youth training/ training for leaders, reached to 774 participants and the "Child Marriage Awareness Campaign," attended by 1075 participants. Through workshops and collaborations with stakeholders, the initiative has amplified the voices of domestic workers, equipping them with tools to address workplace harassment, wage theft, and discrimination.

By fostering collaborations with civil society organizations, RWAs, and other networks, NADW has built a robust framework to support domestic workers, ensuring their inclusion in decision-making and enhancing their access to resources and rights. These achievements underscore Bal Vikas Dhara's dedication to empowering domestic workers and creating a society that values and respects their contributions.

PROJECT OVERVIEW (DSACS)

The DSACS project, implemented by Bal Vikas Dhara at Badarpur, Delhi, is a flagship initiative aimed at reducing the prevalence of HIV/AIDS and improving the health and well-being of vulnerable communities. This project primarily focuses on High-Risk Groups (HRG), including MSM, transgender individuals, and other marginalized populations, providing them with essential health services, counselling, and social support. Since its inception the project has worked tirelessly to empower communities with knowledge, resources, and access to care, fostering a safer and healthier environment for all.

The performance data for 2023–24 highlights the project's remarkable progress and impact. With a target population of 1,000, the project registered over 3,000 individuals by the end of the year, demonstrating its outreach success. Through regular contact and follow-ups, the project maintained engagement with nearly 1,925 active HRG members, ensuring consistent support. Activities such as individual and group counselling sessions, behaviour change communication, and referrals for medical services were conducted extensively. This holistic approach not only raised awareness about HIV/AIDS prevention and treatment but also addressed stigma and discrimination, empowering individuals to lead dignified lives.

By fostering community trust and ensuring sustained engagement, the DSACS project at Badarpur has become a model for effective health interventions in urban settings. Its success lies in its dedicated team, community-driven approach, and commitment to addressing the unique challenges faced by the target population. Moving forward, Bal Vikas Dhara aims to further strengthen its impact by enhancing service delivery, reducing dropout rates, and ensuring long-term sustainability of its initiatives, making significant strides toward achieving a healthier and more inclusive society.

Restoration of Rights for Child Labour Survivors

The Access to Justice project successfully rescued 576 children, including 44 girls and 532 boys, from exploitative child labour conditions in Delhi NCR. With back wages amounting to INR 14,534,580.5 recovered and comprehensive rehabilitation provided, these children were reintegrated into society through psychosocial care and enrolment in educational programs.

Empowering Families Through Social Protection

Expanding its efforts to Bihar, Bal Vikas Dhara enrolled 931 children and their families in social protection schemes. An additional 510 families were rehabilitated, with INR 928,682 in back wages recovered, effectively addressing the root causes of child labour such as poverty and social marginalization.

Holistic Support for Waste Worker Communities

Bal Vikas Dhara's education initiatives supported 400 children from waste worker families through eight education centres, with 188 transitioning to formal schools. Additionally, a cutting and tailoring centre trained 30 women annually in market-relevant skills, promoting economic independence, while waste management innovations recycled 152.603 tonnes of used beverage cartons, contributing to sustainability.

Accessible Healthcare and Nutrition for Marginalized Communities

With an OPD centre catering to 4365 patients and 835 beneficiaries served through health camps, Bal Vikas Dhara ensured accessible medical care. By distributing Dabur nutritional products to 23,099 families, the organization also addressed critical dietary needs, significantly enhancing community health and resilience.

IMPACT



Advocacy for Domestic Workers

Through the *NADW Project*, membership expanded to 42,841 domestic workers across Rajasthan, Karnataka, and Delhi. By facilitating access to health cards, pensions, e-Shram updates, and labor benefits, the project laid a strong foundation for the social and economic security of domestic workers.



Empowering Domestic Workers Through Capacity Building

The Bonus Campaign reached over 5,269 workers, while youth and leadership training impacted 774 participants. Awareness initiatives such as the Child Marriage Awareness Campaign reached 1,075 individuals, equipping domestic workers to address workplace challenges and build resilience.



Reducing HIV/AIDS Prevalence in High-Risk Groups

The DSACS Project in Badarpur, Delhi, reached over 3,000 individuals from high-risk groups, maintaining active engagement with 1,925 members. Through targeted interventions like counselling, behaviour change communication, and medical referrals, the project effectively empowered marginalized communities to lead healthier lives.



Strengthening the Advocacy Network for Sanitation Workers

Bal Vikas Dhara's advocacy initiatives fostered solidarity and amplified the voices of sanitation workers through workshops, documentation, and collaborations with networks like DRT-AIW and IAWP. These efforts enhanced their visibility, recognition, and socio-economic inclusion, building a more equitable environment for these vital workers.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

In the fiscal year 2023, Bal Vikas Dhara successfully utilized 100% of the grant received, amounting to INR 25,650,209. This effective and transparent utilization of funds enabled the organization to impact 167,448 individuals across various programs. The resources were strategically allocated to initiatives focused on education, healthcare, livelihood development, and social protection for marginalized communities. By maintaining meticulous financial accountability, Bal Vikas Dhara ensured that every rupee contributed directly supported its mission to empower vulnerable populations and drive sustainable change. This achievement underscores the organization's commitment to optimizing resources for maximum community benefit.

SPOTLIGHT



Sita, hails from a humble background, with her father working as a rag picker who contributes significantly to keeping the city clean. Her journey of transformation began with Bal Vikas Dhara's Asha Ki Kiran non-formal education program, where she excelled and later secured admission to a government school with the support of her teachers. Alongside her studies, Sita actively participates in community awareness programs, health camps, and cultural events, showcasing her leadership skills and passion for helping others. Currently a bright 10th-grade student, Sita consistently achieves top ranks and has received multiple awards for her academic and extracurricular achievements. Aspiring to become a doctor, she dreams of curing people and making a positive impact on society while continuing to inspire her community.



Nasima, faced numerous hardships growing up in a rag picker family with limited financial means. Unable to pursue her education, she assisted her father in segregation work. At 21, Nasima married, but her life took a difficult turn when her husband abandoned her during her pregnancy, leaving her to raise her child alone at her father's house. Struggling with depression, Nasima's life changed when she learned about Bal Vikas Dhara's Asha Ki Kiran Tailoring Training Centre. In January 2023, Nasima enrolled in the free sixmonth tailoring course offered by the organization. After completing the course, she initially borrowed her sister's sewing machine to start her work. Within a month, she began earning INR 1,500 to 2,000 and gradually increased her income to INR 4,500 to 5,000 per month. Today, Nasima lives independently with her two-year-old child in a rented room and is proud to provide for her family. She credits Bal Vikas Dhara for empowering her with skills and opportunities, enabling her to rebuild her life with dignity and hope.

SPOTLIGHT



During a routine visit to New Delhi Railway Station, Bal Vikas Dhara, in collaboration with the GRPF, identified Sahil Kumar, a young boy who had run away from his village. Recognizing the risks he faced, the staff gained his trust and gathered essential information. Despite challenges, including the absence of a phone, they managed to contact his family.

Sahil was transferred to Seva Kutir Kingsway Camp Child Home under CWC guidance. Upon his parents' arrival, an investigation was conducted, and they were counseled on proper care. After completing formalities, Sahil was reunited with his family. This rescue highlights the critical role of timely intervention and collaboration in protecting vulnerable children.



Aarti (name changed), was rescued on 20th May from a cosmetic shop in Rajouri Garden market. Originally from Gonda district, U.P., Aarti's family of six relied on her father's income as a helper in a transport company. Facing financial difficulties, Aarti left her education after 10th grade to support her family, working long hours for minimal pay of INR 7,000 per month. Despite repeated requests for a salary increase, her employer dismissed her concerns, citing her inexperience.


On the day of the rescue, Aarti was freed from exploitative conditions in shops .Initially apprehensive, Aarti soon felt relieved as the rescue team counselled and supported her, providing food and guidance. After being presented before the CWC, Aarti received INR 78,720 in back wages from her employer. During her stay at the children's home, she made friends, learned valuable lessons, and reflected on the experiences of others like her. Grateful for the intervention, Aarti expressed hope for similar efforts to bring change to the lives of many other children trapped in exploitative labour.

SPOTLIGHT



Dev, a 9-year-old boy, faced a significant health challenge when he contracted dengue. His father, employed as a cleaning worker at the airport, and his mother, a homemaker, struggled to cope with the unexpected medical expenses despite their improved financial situation. During a routine health outreach by Bal Vikas Dhara (BVD), Dev's condition was identified, and immediate medical intervention was arranged. The organization provided essential healthcare support, including doctor consultations, medicines, and nutritional supplements, ensuring his steady recovery. Community mobilizers played a vital role in facilitating access to healthcare services and coordinating with Dev's school to minimize disruptions to his education.

This case underscores the importance of timely medical intervention, community support, and economic stability in addressing the challenges faced by marginalized families.



Sakunti Devi, a 30-year-old mother of four, hails from Nalanda district in Bihar. While her husband works as a driver and her in-laws works as waste worker, Sakunti has played a pivotal role in her family's growth and well-being. Her journey with Bal Vikas Dhara began when her children enrolled in its Asha Ki Kiran education centre. The centre not only provided her children with quality foundational education but also facilitated their transition to government schools, ensuring their continued academic progress.

Sakunti encountered significant hurdles, including the lack of bank accounts, which nearly derailed her children's school admission process. However, with the support of Bal Vikas Dhara, she successfully opened bank accounts for herself and her children, enabling her to access government benefits and save systematically. The organization's unwavering guidance empowered her to navigate complex processes, which she previously found daunting. Today, Sakunti proudly manages her family's finances and expresses deep gratitude for the support that has transformed her life. Her story epitomizes the transformative impact of empowering women and families in marginalized communities, and her unwavering connection with Bal Vikas Dhara reflects her commitment to building a brighter future for her children.

CHALLENGES & OPPURTUNITIES



Bal Vikas Dhara's work with marginalized communities has faced several challenges that highlight the complexities of driving sustainable change.

A significant barrier has been addressing the deep-rooted stigma and discrimination faced by these communities, which often isolates them from mainstream opportunities and resources. Building trust within these communities, many of whom have experienced exploitation or broken promises by external organizations, required consistent engagement and transparency.

Systemic issues such as out-dated or incomplete documentation, misprints in official records, and server downtime during the application process for social protection schemes have hindered access to essential government programs. Additionally, resistance to change—driven by fears of income loss or uncertainty about new opportunities—complicated efforts to introduce innovative and sustainable solutions.

Limited formal education within marginalized communities has posed challenges in implementing programs that require technical understanding or sustained involvement. Health-related challenges remain prevalent, as hazardous living and working conditions, inadequate sanitation, and limited awareness of preventive care contribute to chronic health issues.

Despite these obstacles, Bal Vikas Dhara has turned challenges into opportunities for learning and innovation, refining its strategies to create more inclusive, impactful, and sustainable interventions for marginalized communities.

LEARNINGS



Bal Vikas Dhara's work with marginalized communities has underscored the transformative power of a holistic and community-centric approach.

Key learning's include the importance of building trust and fostering community ownership to ensure long-term sustainability. By addressing interconnected issues—rescuing children from child labour, providing non-formal education, and offering health and livelihood opportunities—BVD has created a ripple effect of positive change.

Tailored education models and skill development programs have empowered families to break cycles of poverty, while preventive healthcare interventions and awareness campaigns have improved overall well-being. Collaborating with stakeholders such as Urban Local Bodies, corporates, and international organizations has further amplified the impact, enabling BVD to scale its initiatives effectively.

However, challenges have offered valuable lessons in adaptability and innovation. Overcoming systemic barriers such as stigmatization, distrust, and limited access to government schemes required persistence, technology-driven solutions, and capacity-building efforts.

Geo-tagged monitoring, tech-enabled health and education services, and direct market linkages for marginalised have proven instrumental in driving results. The experience reaffirms that sustainable change stems from empowering communities to lead their own development journeys, creating a self-reinforcing ecosystem of dignity, opportunity, and progress.
